We celebrate in our schools as well with Orange Shirt Day in September, along with guest speakers to give our students insight of true life experiences. We have also included many new books in our libraries that speak authentically about the lives of our predecessors on our lands.</p>

These relationships are key to reconciliation, a process to which the Board should be committed to. Here are some ways to help reconcile and create stronger relationships with the community:</p>
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- Before O Canada all schools should adopt a statement of recognition that we are on the land of the Mississauga’s New Credit First Nations. Some schools have started this, but it should be done in all schools around the board. “Before we start, we would like to acknowledge that (school name) is situated upon traditional territories," the Mississauga’s New Credit First Nations.
 - We should provide more opportunities to Indigenous students and community members to harness a stronger relationship.
 - We should create, celebrate and promote the Indigenous peoples/ the Mississaugas’ of the New Credit First Nation by implementing a heritage month.
