Councillor	Chris Fonseca	<p>I am a strong supporter of preserving and promoting our natural and cultural heritage, and heritage sites and buildings. This helps us feel personally connected to our neighbourhoods, community and City, provides us many opportunities to define our identity and work together to ensure that our heritage remains a vital part of the present and future Mississauga. Identified heritage places, whether buildings, neighbourhoods, parks, are an excellent local educational resource for people of all ages. Learning about the history of a place is a good way of bringing communities together through a shared understanding of the unique cultural identity heritage places give to an area. I personally walk, cycle and run 3-5 times per week on the Applewood and Etobicoke Creek Trails and through the Ward 3 park and watershed systems, and have come to appreciate how this natural heritage is tied to the history and heritage of aboriginal culture along the Etobicoke Creek and the "Mississauga Tract", as well as our agricultural heritage and transportation heritage and the history of "woods" in Ward 3 – Applewood; Dixie Woods, Fleetwood, Garnetwood, Rathwood – all neighbourhoods have incredible stories to tell and tied to the natural history, as well as the settlement of different immigrant populations. I do whatever I can to promote and encourage residents to explore the neighbourhoods that they live in. This, in turn, sparks conversation and ideas on how to celebrate our history and heritage. As a Councillor, I have been committed to protecting and preserving our natural heritage by sitting on the Toronto Region Conservation Authority (TRCA), Partners in Project Green Water Stewardship Committee, and Mississauga Cycling Advisory Committees.</p> <p>I was the Councillor who proposed "Ward Community Bike Rides" that have grown into full-fledged community rides which take cyclists on routes through our natural heritage treasures. I have hosted a "Heritage In the Park" event in Fleetwood Park, and have had conversations with Riverwood Conservancy about a cycling event connecting Riverwood to Garnetwood Park with a natural heritage celebration at "each end" of the Burnhamthorpe Trail. I have a goal of hosting a "Festival of the Woods" to celebrate the incredible "Woods of Ward 3" and will work with various community organizations on this.</p> <p>I am also a strong believer that heritage sites and buildings can have a very positive influence on many aspects of the way a community develops. While the City of Mississauga is a relatively "young" City, we do have a number of heritage buildings and of course many heritage sites that we need to celebrate. Working with an organization like Heritage Mississauga is essential in making this happen. Fewer than 40% of Ontario municipalities have a volunteer and/or formal Heritage Committee. I would like to say "THANK YOU" to Heritage Mississauga for all that you do to educate, promote, protect, preserve heritage in our City!!! I am a Councillor who supported Heritage Mississauga being recognized as a pillar organization and will continue to do so. Protecting and preserving heritage buildings and sites contributes to the regeneration of communities through adaptive reuse of heritage buildings and sites – for example the Small Arms Building, opportunities for different housing types, education to the public on the significance of where they are living, working, playing, economic growth to Mississauga and, as mentioned above, community engagement. In Ward 3, we have a number of churches and cemeteries that I have worked with staff and different congregations to protect, preserve and develop programming with – St. John's Dixie and Cemetery, Dixie Union Chapel &amp; Cemetery the oldest in all of Peel, Dixie Presbyterian Church celebrating 140 years!</p>	<p>It is extremely important to Mississauga, as we continue to grow in population, and with such diversity, that we support our simultaneous ability to preserve and invent our culture—that is, to conserve our history and heritage while developing new expressions for current times. Often, the concept of preservation is interpreted as meaning stagnation when, in fact, heritage and history can be the basis for innovation and advancement. Moreover, heritage and history are frequently essential sources of meaning that give a place character and resonance. In the City of Mississauga, with so much diversity and complexity, the histories of many communities are layered and contested. Groups settle and move away, each leaving some remnant of who they were and why they had come to that particular place. Sometimes they leave voluntarily. Sometimes they are forced to leave. Sometimes they do not leave at all. All of these groups—present and departed, rich and poor—have stories to tell, stories that can be collected, conserved, and celebrated. The articulation of those stories can significantly contribute to the planning process by preserving, celebrating, challenging, and inventing community identity.</p> <p>As a City Councillor, I feel that it is, in part, my responsibility, to continue to reach out to as many groups as possible, to connect them with others, to ensure that our heritage, past, present and future, is protected, preserved, celebrated.</p> <p>Everyone has things that they treasure; mementos and keepsakes that have been saved or passed down through generations as a way of remembering and honouring family, community, events or places.</p> <p>In many cases, these things don't need to be worth a lot of money to make them special, but rather, are priceless because of the ties they represent to an individual's or a group's historical background.</p> <p>Heritage values are the tangible and intangible associations a society collectively holds to a person, place or thing. As I have noted above, it is our responsibility to continue to find ways to educate residents on the significance of the history and heritage of the Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation, including the ancestral territory. Flying the Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation at City Hall, identifying locations throughout the City where we can put plaques, inviting Elders, and whomever is the appropriate individuals to our civic, cultural, historic events to participate through smudging ceremonies, continuing to work with them to participate in Carassuaga, work through the Living Arts Centre on what might be appropriate grant funding to apply for, and perhaps providing funding through Heritage Mississauga to work with the Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation to create a video that can be streamed at Celebration Square, are some tangible ideas.</p>

This year, St Mary’s Ukrainian Catholic Church, to name a few. All of these communities have incredible knowledge of the history and heritage significance of their sites, and finding ways to celebrate is extremely important.

In some cases, where there may not be a heritage building, it is very important to understand and know the history of a community and work with different cultural groups that have settled over time in that community to find ways to continue to educate residents on the historical significance of a neighbourhood. For example, in ward 3, Saturnia, Ivernia, Sylvania, Queen Frederica streets all reference ships that carried European immigrants over to Canada and many of the first residents on these streets knew/know this fact, however new families moving in to the neighbourhood do not. Working with these cultural groups, and/or through a BIA or Homeowners Organization, plaques or some identification through the Culture Master Plan would help to educate the residents. Another recent example is that I am working with the Vietnamese community to have a memorial of the Vietnamese Boat People installed at Dixie and Burnhamthorpe on the library property. This is significant because many of the Vietnamese Boat People settled in this community in ward 3 when they first arrived.

The historic environment is also a proven source of benefit to local economies, particularly through tourism. Statistics show that 25% of Ontarians travel for arts or cultural experience, 27% participate in a cultural experience as part of trip, and the time is now for our great City of Mississauga to showcase all that we have to offer! I have been a supporter of the Mississauga Culture and Tourism Master Plans and we also now have the Hotel Tax that we can apply to promoting tourism, culture and heritage in our City. I have also supported and focused on the importance of protecting and preserving our heritage along the Dundas Corridor in the Dundas Master Plan.
