



Dazzling colours, intoxicating beats, classical instruments and elegant yet energetic dancers are all elements of the Bollywood culture, and Bollywood Monster Mashup (BMM) exhibits all of this and more.

Born in 2011 and now the largest South Asian festival in Canada, the first BMM was created as an IIFA Buzz event alongside the International Indian Film Academy Awards coming to Toronto. It became a stand-alone festival in 2012, and continues to be organized in full by MonstrARTity Creative Community. Over the years, BMM has evolved from a single concert to a variety of



special events leading up to a two-day program at Mississauga Celebration Square, featuring local artists and international Bollywood headliners.

Music is the driving force of Bollywood Monster Mashup, supported by dance and film. The festival fuses Bollywood favourites with western music and dance to be

welcoming to all cultures, and produces an original fusion music act to feature each year. Along with music, dance and film, the BMM festival has included club nights, artist development summits, comedy shows, painting parties, KidZone activities, interactive dance lessons and more. Bollywood Monster Mashup is proud to be the only festival of its kind in Canada.

Prior to 2011, Filipinos living in Mississauga and its environs celebrated their freedom by commemorating Philippine Independence Day in June of each year through a large pot luck picnic at Mississauga Valley Park. The attendance to this celebration dwindled over the years with some Filipino organizations doing their own. The celebration was largely limited to the Filipino community.

With the construction of Mississauga Celebration Square, Kalayaan Filipino Cultural Organization (KFCO), being the umbrella organization for Filipino organizations in Mississauga, aimed to raise the profile of the Filipinos in Mississauga by holding the Independence Day celebration at the Square. KFCO approached two large Filipino cultural groups in addition to the Kalayaan Cultural Community Centre (KCCC) to partner and make this goal a reality. The Culture



Philippines of Ontario, which hosts the Philippine pavilion at the annual Carassauga festival, the Fiesta Filipina Dance Troupe, which hosts the Philippine pavilion at the annual Carabram festival



and the KCCC all saw the need to raise the profile of the Filipinos and make a Filipino event available to the public. Thus, all three organizations agreed to partner with KFCO to hold "Fiesta ng Kalayaan" at the Mississauga Celebration Square. That was in 2011, since then it's been a huge success each and every year.

Mississauga, The Festival City

At incorporation in 1974, Mississauga's population was quoted as 222, 329; today the City's website puts the figure at 752,000 with projected growth to 878,000 by 2041.

Mississauga is no longer a bedroom community to service the surrounding area, but has grown instead to the sixth largest city in Canada with a large multicultural community who expect arts, heritage and cultural entertainment on their doorstep.

In addition to longstanding events like Streetsville Founders' Bread & Honey Festival which started in the early 1970's, recent years, have seen an explosion of large festivals showcasing the city's many diverse groups that contribute to Mississauga's cultural melting pot. This increase has largely been empowered by the spectacular facility at Mississauga Celebration Square, which contributes to our unique multicultural personality, providing a communal heart to our city.

While community growth is initially attributed to a sustainable employment market, the reason people choose to stay is largely for a vibrant cultural landscape resulting in long term residents and a growing municipal tax base. Jobs are created, partnerships are forged and residents are exposed to many different experiences resulting in an understanding, celebration and acceptance of diverse culture heritage. 



Over the past 12 years, MuslimFest has grown into an awardwinning, signature Mississauga festival attracting 28,000 attendees.



Mississaugas of the New Credit Three Fires Pow Wow

A Powwow is a way for the Anishinabe people to share their unique customs and cultural identity through the heartbeat of the drum, song and way of life. A traditional Powwow was (and still is) a way of life for many First Nations groups. The Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation belong to the group of Anishinabe People, whose original language is Ojibway, belonging to the Algonquian linguistic group. The three fires are symbolic of the Mississaugas traditional and political alliance with the other Ojibway, Odawa, and Pottowatomi Nations.

Our very first Powwow was held in 1987, the first time the drum sounded in over 100 years for the Mississaugas of the New Credit. The Mississaugas will be celebrating 30 years over the August 27 & 28, 2016 weekend. The Three Fires Homecoming Powwow and Traditional Gathering received its name because of the homecoming of the drum, culture and traditions.

The sound of the drum was the reawakening for the Mississaugas to take their rightful place within their culture, heritage and language. The weekend long celebrations are held in the "Grove" area, which is a place that is very sacred for the Mississaugas and a place that is shared on a yearly basis to bring understanding and awareness of who we are as a people, to the greater society.





Since 1987, we have seen our little gathering of 30 dancers (2 New Credit Members) and 4 drums that started out on the ball diamond, grow to sometimes over 250 dancers and 18 - 20 drums. Receiving support from our Chief and Council and surrounding businesses and organizations helps make our event a great success that is well attended year after year. We are known on the Powwow Trail as the "Best Little Powwow Around" because of our unique location. The "Grove" area is a blanket of trees that surrounds our event and folds us in the arms of our Ancestors. The "Grove" area is serene, warm and loving with nothing but nature around to bring the feel of the gentle summer breeze as you watch the magic happen around the arbor. Everyone loves the trees!

Our intimate location brings communities of old and new friends together from both Native and non-Native groups. Since social media has taken off, people from around the world such as: France, England, Germany, Australia, New Zealand and China have used our event to come together to experience their first Powwow and to meet each other. What a great way to bring people together!



The Three Fires Homecoming Powwow and Traditional Gathering have a "Giveaway" ceremony that is held on Sunday and is a way for many First Nations people to show their appreciation to all those who have participated in the Powwow. It's not the amount of things a person owns, but rather, by how much a person gives away. Kindness, thoughtfulness, and sincerity by a nation are shown during the Giveaway. Our Powwow and committee are honoured to have been supported by many surrounding businesses who also donate items for the Giveaway.



Transport yourself through time and come walk through our lush grove full of native species of plants and natural medicines. The Veterans Memorial will also be open for public viewing.

The Streetsville Founders' Bread and Honey Festival

A festival is recognized as a feast or joyous celebration, which has long been recognized as an event which fosters a sense of community pride and well-being. Traditionally, festivals have centred on the seasons, especially in the spring and fall. But they can occur at any time.

The oldest known and longest running festival in Mississauga is the Streetsville Agricultural Fair at Memorial Park. It was first celebrated in the fall of 1843. A few decades later, it became the Toronto Agricultural Fair and it remained so for over 100 years.

Agricultural fairs, parades and celebrations have been an integral part of the community life of Streetsville ever since. addition of the Streetsville Founders' Bread and Honey festival in 1973 was a natural continuation of this tradition. The festival was developed by the Streetsville Chamber of Commerce, notably by President Sam McCallion, in order to celebrate the history and the founders of the town on the eve of its becoming part of the City of Mississauga.

Two of the early mills of Streetsville provided service to the pioneers by grinding their wheat and in the 1880's William Couse brought fame to the area with the excellence of his honey. These two industries gave the festival its name and its unique flavour. The flour and honey continued to be produced in Streetsville and ADM Milling provided the funds to purchase the bread, butter and honey and they sponsored a booth, which provided an area for hundreds of local volunteers to slice and butter bread and then spread the sweet honey onto hundreds of thousands of slices of bread and honey free of charge to everyone who entered the festival. This practice is still used today but because of the many changes of ownership the Mills no longer provide the bread, butter and honey. Last year for the first time Panera Bread Restaurants provided the bread for the festival.

The original one day festival under the founding presidency of Sam McCallion (1923-1997) has grown over the past 45 years into a three day event. The festival grounds are the Streetsville Memorial Park and initially the festival was funded by donations from local sponsors and entrance fees. Today because of higher costs the committee receives grants from the City of Mississauga and the Ontario Festival organizations to sponsor this event.

The Streetsville Community Centre and Vic Johnston Arena are used for displays and entertainment while the island over the Credit River footbridge is a playground of fun for families with young children featuring staged performers, craft sales and food. The mainland provides a large bandstand for continuous entertainment, with jazz, country and local entertainment which provides a great environment for festival goers for the whole weekend. This area has a petting zoo, beer tent, carnival rides and great food from many local restaurants together with the participation of local clubs and organizations.

In the beginning, an open wood fired oven was built to bake bread, but fire regulations had it removed. A bread baking contest was held in the Community hall for over 40 years, but has been discontinued since the bread baking machines have become the norm.

On Saturday mornings there is a festival parade with thousands lining Queen Street from Britannia to Old Station Road. This starts at 10:00 a.m. and ends around 12:00 noon. Many bring their lawn chairs and snacks and it is an exciting time for the crowds in Streetsville, which later descend onto the grounds of Memorial Park for a fun day. On Sunday morning there is a pancake breakfast provided in the hall and Councillor George Carlson sponsors a fishing derby for the children.

Today there is a monument at the entrance of Memorial Park, which was donated by Canada Brick in 1992 and designed by the late John Emerson to commemorate the Bread and Honey Festival which is held annually on the first weekend in June. It stands on the crest of the hill for all to enjoy as they enter the park.

The Doors Open phenomenon started in France in 1984. The idea soon spread through Europe, with the events united as European Heritage Days at the initiative of the

Council of Europe in 1991. The City of Toronto launched North America's first Doors Open event in 2000, and the concept continues to grow across the continent.

In 2002, the Ontario Heritage Trust launched Doors Open Ontario, the first province wide event of its kind in Canada, to create access, awareness and excitement about Ontario's heritage. Since then, the program has attracted 5.8 million visitors to explore over 15,000 sites. Doors Open events foster alliances among community partners and attract visitors to unique cultural tourism experiences that not only boost the local economies, but also encourage pride and volunteerism. Doors Open is an international movement to encourage people to explore "behind closed doors" places of interest around the City of Mississauga. The event is presented by participating sites with the support of the City of Mississauga's Culture Division in association with the Doors Open program of the Ontario Heritage Trust.

Doors Open is a province wide event that is held annually and is free of charge to those participating. The event provides an opportunity for the community of Mississauga to highlight specific locations that have cultural, historic, social, environmental or architectural significance. The purpose of the event is to connect people living in and around Mississauga with the different locations throughout the city that may not be familiar.

The first Doors Open Mississauga event was held in 2003, which originated with less than 10 participating sites. Each year the event gained popularity and new sites were added to the participation list. In 2010 there were 19 sites participating, and in 2011 there were 37 participating sites. In recent years we have had over 40 participating sites and thousands of people exploring each location annually.

The year 2013 was significant for Doors Open as Mississauga held the first Morning Official Opening Ceremony to kick off the Doors Open day and then Mayor, Hazel McCallion and Councillor, Bonnie Crombie were two of many key speakers. They were also major partners in planning the ceremony and other key events throughout the city. This event was held at the International Centre and included a full sized replica of the Avro Arrow (signifying the historical significance between the Avro Arrow and Mississauga's aviation history). The ceremony concluded with a ribbon cutting and a note of warm wishes from the Mayor to participants and sites.


Elders will also provide traditional

Mississauga Santa Claus Parade November 27, 2016, Streetsville www.mississaugasanta.com

The first time the Mississauga Santa Claus Parade marched into town was in 1974 after a group of dedicated volunteers decided that the jolly old elf should make a formal appearance in the growing city. In those early years, the parade was held in the Square One area, with varying routes along Hurontario Street and Burnhamthorpe Road, ending at Square One.







In early 2002, the Streetsville Business Improvement Association (BIA) was asked by the City of Mississauga if they would be willing to manage and host the parade and they accepted readily. The historic village has a long history of welcoming Santa, with



reports going back as early as 1964, that Santa was seen about town on a fire truck at the volunteer fire hall. Under the auspices of the BIA, the Village had its own small community parade starting in 1990. In 1996, there were 17 local groups represented in the parade led by the Streetsville Pipes and Drums and the Streetsville Legion Colour Party as they have done from 1990 to today. A favourite entry in those early years was a steam tractor with Jim Laidlaw at its controls.

The parade is held on the last Sunday in November starting at 1pm. It has about 75 groups represented and takes about an hour to make its way down Queen Street, from Britannia Road to Old Station Road, to the delight of between 40,000 and 50,000 Santa lovers young and old who welcome the man in red.

15th Annual Haunted Mississauga
