

### It's Back!

Last spring, when Heritage Mississauga (HM) staff were putting together the first double-feature Festivals newsletter, they knew there would be a wide audience for the issue. Initially, a number of the festival groups they contacted were a little surprised that we were promoting their events. But when the Festivals newsletter hit people's desks and doorsteps, feedback was overwhelmingly positive, including comments along the lines of, "You're going to be doing this again next year, right?"

So we are very happy to again support Mississauga's many diverse community organizations by communicating festival information to as wide an audience as possible in this popular edition. By raising the profile of all festivals, we can help raise attendance, raise funds for worthy cultural initiatives, and raise awareness *outside* Mississauga of our city as an appealing and entertaining place to visit.

Recently, **Mississauga received the Municipality of the Year Award from Festivals & Events Ontario (FEO)** in the category of (city) population over 150,000. In announcing FEO award winners, the organization spoke of the importance of festivals in creating a positive environment within their communities. FEO also placed 4 Mississauga festivals in their "Top 100": the Streetsville Founders' Bread & Honey Festival; MuslimFest; Mississauga ITALFEST; and SoundBites 2017: Mississauga Celebration Square.

### 2016 Festival Memories & 150th Festivals

One of the longest-running and largest festivals on our City's annual calendar is **Carassauga**. Last year, weekend temperatures were grilling-hot during the event. Many of my photos showed beet-red faces, and we had to keep our Thompson's Company reenactors well supplied with water, as they were photo-op'd outside in their winter-weight wool uniforms. My husband and I had great respect (not to mention sympathy) for the hardiness of the various dancing troupes, whose ultra-athletic leaps, lifts and squat-kicks were performed in 30+C temperatures.

This year, HM is anticipating a great few days at the Canada Pavilion, this year hosted by the Royal Canadian Legion Streetsville Branch 139. There will be Canada specific food, entertainment and traditions in addition to historic Aboriginal and 1812 encampments and the Heritage Section will be located inside the Streetsville Legion on the second floor.

Besides Carassauga, Heritage Mississauga will be participating and supporting many local festivals, programs and events city-wide. We look forward to sharing these cultural celebrations with you this year.

### Beyond The Exhibitors' Tables

Of course, Heritage Mississauga isn't all about festivals. On April 1st, our Board completed our **triennial strategic planning session**. We evaluated our performance over the previous three years, examined what changes, if any, were needed to our overall vision, values, pillars (areas of focus), programs, current strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, threats. This is the fourth session where our directors, Executive Director Jayme Gaspar, and facilitator Linda Thomas have invested a day to challenge and fine-tune our strategic direction, and I believe it has resulted in a remarkably consistent, efficient, and high performance organization.

Committee members are in the midst of promoting the **May 30<sup>th</sup> Heritage Luncheon** advertised elsewhere in this newsletter, with John Moore of Radio 1010 and Michael Spaziani of MSAi in a moderated conversation, "Mississauga Heritage, a Contradiction in Terms?" If you haven't already done so, here's your reminder to call and purchase your tickets *now* through HM's office at 905-828-8411 ext. "0"!

Our **Annual General Meeting** is yet another major event happening in May. In honour of Canada's 150<sup>th</sup> and the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Vimy Ridge, we will have an in-demand guest speaker, Honorary Colonel Gerald Haddon at the podium once the business portion of the AGM is completed. To accommodate a larger audience, we'll be at the Port Credit Royal Canadian Legion Branch #82, 35 Front Street North.

One more initiative that should be underway by the end of May is the launch of a pilot for our **Oral History product**. This is an extension of the "personal histories" work HM has done for decades. We expect two summer students will begin work under our Historian, Matthew Wilkinson, and if the pilot is a success, you will be hearing much more about this in the future.

This Festival double issue will be your quick guide to planning a fun family weekend or a night out with friends over the next few months. Perhaps you'll even want to keep it as a **sesquicentennial souvenir** - here's what our City looked like, here's what we were up to in 2017, isn't it incredible how quickly things change?

The ceremony was presented by Mississauga Fire & Emergency Services and the Toronto Scottish Regiment with remarks by Mayor Crombie, Ward 9 Councillor Pat Saito, MP Gagan Sikand, and the Hon Dipika Damerla, MPP. In attendance was John Hare, a Second World War Veteran whose father fought at Vimy Ridge. Many thanks to Denise Mahoney, Manager, Cemeteries & Operational Services, City of Mississauga for developing and organizing this project and to Anna Ferguson, Parks Beautification Program Coordinator, City of Mississauga for her inspiring mural design. There will be a number of additional events in honour of those who fought at Vimy Ridge throughout the year. Visit our website for more details. We will remember them.

## Festivals Marked Centennial Commemorations in 1967

July 1, 2017 marks 150 years since Canadian Confederation. In the theme of festivals, we are going to take a look back to 1967, 50 years ago, and look at what took place here to mark the Centennial of Canadian Confederation. Looking back, 1967 offers an interesting peek into a moment in time in historic Mississauga (then Toronto Township), and how this place marked the centennial of Confederation.

At Confederation Square in front of the former Town Hall, a Centennial Torch Lighting Ceremony on December 31, 1966 kicked off the year-long commemoration of Confederation.

Winter Centennial Carnival Advertisement, Port Credit Weekly, February 8, 1967

With a few initial challenges (the flame would not, at first, stay lit) the Centennial Torch was lit by Reeve Robert Speck, Councillor R.K. Harrison (Chairman of the Toronto Township Centennial Committee and Director of the Toronto Township Historical Foundation – now Heritage Mississauga), and Eleanor Blake (Centennial Committee Coordinator). The Centennial Torch was intended to burn throughout 1967, 24 hours a day, similar to the Centennial Flame at Parliament Hill in Ottawa. The lighting of the Centennial Torch was reportedly accompanied by a 100-gun salute and the ringing of local church bells.

Toronto Township was home to a number of Confederation Centennial events and festivals in 1967, including a Centennial Beauty Pageant in February of 1967. Jean Smalley, a high school student from Cooksville was chosen as the Centennial Queen, beating out 10 other contestants. The beauty pageant was a part of the larger Centennial Winter Carnival held on February 10-11, 1967 at the newly opened Huron Park Arena. Over 1000 people turned out for the confederation-themed costumed skating party alone! The summer of 1967 brought a special Canada Day – Confederation Centennial Parade, which ran from Cooksville to Port Credit along Hurontario Street.

But the largest event locally took place between August 11 and 15, 1967, with a number of ceremonies and the arrival of the Confederation Caravan. On August 11, 1967, the Toronto Township Historical Foundation

(Heritage Mississauga) together with the Ontario Heritage Foundation (now Ontario Heritage Trust) unveiled a plaque commemorating Sir William Pearce Howland (1807-1911), a Father of Confederation, who had once lived in, operated a business in, and was elected to represent the historic community of Cooksville. The plaque was erected in front of the former Town Hall. (The plaque will be replaced in a new, nearby location in the coming months).

On August 12, 1967 the Confederation Caravan stopped at St. Lawrence Park in Port Credit, and stayed for 3 days. Reportedly thousands flocked to the area to see the caravan. According to the *Port Credit Weekly*, "the Centennial Caravans are much more than just a travelling museum exhibit, instead it can be thought of as a time machine that showcased the everyday lives of people in Canada before it became its own nation."

Artfest Port Credit is a 3-day outdoor art and craft festival that takes place May 26-28 in Port Credit Memorial Park. Artfest Ontario, is run by Lory MacDonald who has a reputation for hosting high quality events in beautiful historic settings. It features over 100 award winning artists from across Ontario and Quebec including many local artists. Visitors will see pottery, glass, jewellery, paintings, woodcrafts, photography, gourmet foods and more. This is the 3<sup>rd</sup> year for the art festival in Port Credit's Memorial Park. The waterfront location is an ideal setting for this outdoor juried Arts & Craft show. The artists love the venue and the Port Credit downtown area. Originally, the show was temporarily moved to Port Credit from the Distillery Historic District in Toronto, but the artists loved the area so much, that they wanted to make the show a permanent feature event in Port Credit.



Exhibiting Artists are designing and selling new products reflecting Canada's 150th Birthday. Additionally, special free children's Canada 150 art activities will take place in the Artfest Kids Art tent.

Artfest Port Credit is free to the public and features free art workshops for children and live music. There is a food area with a variety of delicious cultural food choices. The hours are Friday 4pm-9pm, Saturday 10am-6pm, and Sunday 10am-5pm.



### Carassauga, Mississauga's Festival of Cultures

Carassauga Festival is an incorporated not-for-profit volunteer community organization that will be celebrating its 32nd Anniversary in 2017. It operated for the first time in 1986 with 10 Pavilions. Carassauga was created in response to a challenge put out by the former Mayor of Mississauga, Hazel McCallion, to all ethno cultural groups at a meeting of her calling in the old City Hall in the fall of 1985. It has quickly evolved into a 3 - day, 22 hour event.

During the Festival weekend, guests will be able to visit multiple Pavilions for only the cost of a Carassauga Passport. Passports are \$10.00 in advance and \$12.00 at the door. Visitors will experience the breathtaking entertainment, taste the exotic cuisine and enjoy the cultural diversity of the many cultures showcased in our 31 Pavilions.

Our opening Ceremony takes place on Friday, May 26th at 7:30pm on our Outdoor Stage located at the Hershey Centre featuring a Parade of Nations, special guests and premiering a NEW International Flag Dance. On Saturday, May 27th Carassauga celebrates Canada's 150th Anniversary by presenting three Canadian tribute acts; Bryan Adams, Shania Twain and the Guess Who. Some Pavilions have special performances at their own location. Visit our Kids Zone, a family fun area located in the Indoor Soccer Field at the Mississauga SportZone. Sign a large birthday card for Canada's 150th and have your photo taken with our mascots; Carra & Missi, also Elsa, Spiderman, Belle and Captain America. Ride FREE on Mi Way or the Carassauga Shuttle buses during Festival hours. Children 12 and under are FREE when accompanied by an adult passport holder. FREE parking is available at all Pavilion locations, with extra overflow parking at Hershey Centre.

### Vesak: Buddha's Birthday Celebration 2017

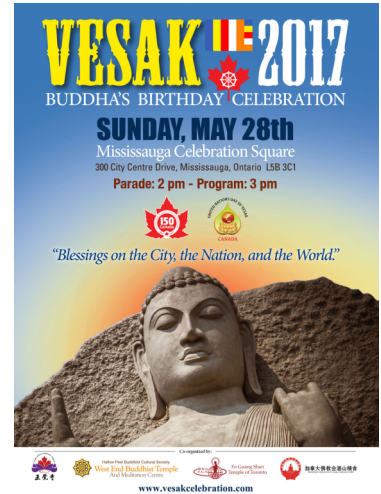

Vesak is the festival celebrating the birth, enlightenment and death of the Buddha, some 2600 years ago. Buddhists around the world mark the event with food, parades, costumes, cultural performances and charitable works.

This family-friendly day of art, food and entertainment from many parts of South East Asia and Canada is hosted by four Buddhist temples representing all three of the major schools of Buddhist thought. In addition, the event this year commemorates Canada's 150th birthday & United Nations day of Vesak.



From humble beginnings in 2013 our event has become the largest Vesak festival in Canada. Last year we had 30 participating temples, over 100 monks and nuns from all three major Buddhist traditions and 25 VIPs from all three levels of Canadian government and the diplomatic corps. This year to celebrate Canada's 150th there will be a special initiation speech by Bhante Saranapala and other dignitaries. The event could be described as a South East Asian cultural festival with more than a dozen languages from about 20 countries, native costumes, music, dance, food and fellowship - all served up with a Canadian perspective.



We invite you to eat ethnic delicacies, enjoy the devotional art, listen to monks and nuns chant, watch volunteer singers and dancers perform and participate in our Buddhism 101 tent to learn how Buddhism is a vibrant part of the Canadian mosaic.

### Streetsville Founders' Bread & Honey Festival

The Streetsville Founders' Bread & Honey Festival is the largest and longest running festival in Mississauga and in all of Ontario only 2nd to the CNE. Although this TOP 100 Festival continues to grow year after year attracting visitors from all over, you will still get the

feel of a small friendly village, celebrating its history, traditions and community spirit. Founded in 1972 and incorporated in 1973, now celebrating its 45th year, the festival reflects the history of the Streetsville Founder Timothy Street and the flour mill he built in 1821 in the town of Streetsville, that still exists today. Each year at the festival everyone enjoys complimentary freshly baked bread, generously coated with honey, supplied by our bee keeper.

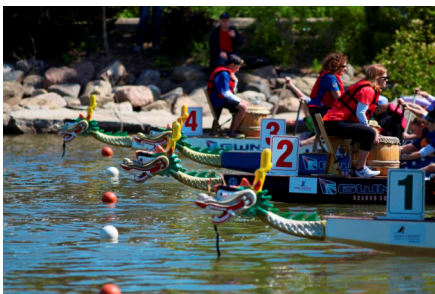

The Mississauga Dragon Boat Festival originated in 2003 after club representatives realized the potential for both the Canoe Club and City to be involved with the Mississauga Waterfront Festival (MWF). In the inaugural MDBF event, a team lead by Mac Hickox (past Head Coach at MCC) coordinated the 'maiden paddle' of the club's inclusion in the MWF with Mayor Hazel McCallion sitting up front in the ceremonial Drummers Seat of the first Dragon Boat down the race course. Organizers at

the Club at that time had the vision to intertwine the great fundraising opportunity that is the Dragon Boat Festival with the MWF celebrations. Back then, dragon boating was and still is, a booming recreational activity fit for any and all participants. It was a natural complimentary activity to the MWF and a fantastic opportunity to showcase the Credit River and surrounding local businesses. Recently, the Canoe Club has added its annual sprint racing Home Regatta, (a yearly tradition since 1959) and other racing events to the calendar leading into the Mississauga Waterfront Festival - further contributing to making the first two weeks of June here in Port Credit a bustling time for the community. This year as part of our Canada 150 celebrations, we are including a brief history discussion of our area, who the early inhabitants of it were and what contributed to putting Port Credit on the map as a component of our weekly youth summer camp.

The Mississauga Waterfront Festival was founded in 1997. The City of Mississauga approached Patricia Anderson, O.M.C. festival Chairperson, to create an event for the community to celebrate the refurbishing and grand re-opening of the Port Credit Marina.

The following year the event was registered as a not-for-profit organization servicing the needs of marginalized families. The MWF has a very holistic and inclusive philosophy.

We have partnered with Service Clubs such as, the Lions Club, Civitan's and St. John's Ambulance giving them an opportunity to earn money for their organizations by assisting us in operating various components of our event. We have given scholarships to young people who volunteer for the event through their schools or institutes: Sheridan Police Foundations and Metalworks Institute.

Each year the event has grown and is now a free event to ensure that families of all income levels are welcome to celebrate being a part of the community.

The MWF is now attracting 71,000 people to Mississauga annually. Through our Sponsor a Child Program, we have also invited 4,000 marginalized families annually to the Festival providing free food and carnival rides.

Now celebrating our 21st year, we are very pleased to have accomplished such great outreach work in Mississauga.

Since the 1880s, when immigrants from Ukraine to Canada embraced the opportunity to work, prosper and raise families in peace and freedom, Ukrainian culture has enriched the Canadian landscape in every facet of life. Today, over four million people in Canada can trace their heritage to Ukraine, and Ukrainian Canadians, by virtue of 125 years of contribution, are well organized and respected members of their communities.



In 1995, Toronto was twinned with Kyiv, the capital of Ukraine, and to mark this occasion, the Bloor West Village Toronto Ukrainian Festival was established under the umbrella of the Ukrainian Canadian Congress - Toronto Branch. Originally known as the Bloor West Village Ukrainian Festival, it was meant to be a showcase of the most widely identifiable aspects of Ukrainian culture in Canada – music, dance, food, visual arts and community. It was an instant hit, establishing itself as one of the premier Ukrainian festivals in North America and growing to attract audiences well in excess of 700,000 from across Canada, the US and abroad. In an effort to share the rich traditions of Ukrainian culture to a growing audience, the festival has expanded to include a day of toe tapping, high stepping dance and music to take place in the heart of Mississauga. The **Mississauga Ukrainian Festival**, happening at Celebration Square on June 17th, 2017, offers something for everyone. Sample the culture and cuisine of Ukraine. Enjoy the outdoor market and meet local artisans. Savour delights from Ukraine in the refreshment garden and above all else ENJOY!! Out of that first networking experience came the formation of a "Malton Community Council", which evolved in subsequent years as a settlement service organization, pivotal in our community, today known as Malton Neighbourhood Services. The Festival grew, largely sponsored by the Board of Directors of Malton Neighbourhood Services, working in close cooperation with the Malton Community Centre. The Malton Community Festival operated annually until 1995.

In 2004 former Mayor McCallion challenged the community to restore this important annual tradition. Members of the Board of Directors of MNS, local organizations and individuals responded to this call to action. MNS Chair Lucy Hutchinson and MNS Secretary Helene Burrowes joined with Russ Pooley of Mississauga Recreation and Parks to form a community-based Festival Steering Committee. The renewed Malton Community Festival re-appeared in the fall of 2005. By 2007 there were displays from 80 organizations and 2,500 people attending. Malton Community Festival has grown into an incorporated not-for-profit running a free two-day event featuring community booths and displays, outstanding entertainment, family activities, and barbeque show-casing our diverse community.



We are excited this year to move the Festival forward and do something different. Malton Community Festival plans to celebrate our historic community and Canada 150 and invite you to take part as Malton celebrates this great milestone in our country's history! 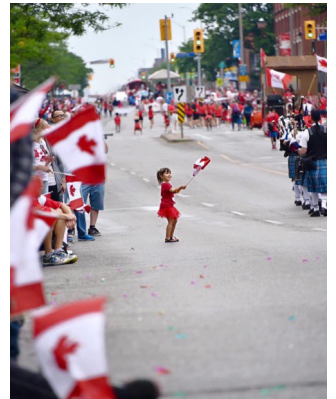


### Paint the Town Red – Port Credit
