



National Flag of Canada

Also Referred to as a "Maple Leaf", the flag received Royal Proclamation and was first flown on 15 February, 1965.



Coat-of-Arms

Also referred to as the Arms of Canada, or the Queen in Right of Canada, they were proclaimed by King George V on 21 November, 1921.

National Sports

Lacrosse and Ice Hockey were officially adopted as the two National Sports of Canada on 12 May, 1994.



Beaver

Royal Assent was granted on 24 March, 1975 for the beaver (Castor Canadensis) to become a "National Symbol" of the Sovereignty of Canada.



Armorial Bearings (Shield)

Granted 30 April, 1921, the shield refers to the Royal Arms of England, Scotland, Ireland and France, together with three red maple leaves for Canada.



Maple Tree

The common Maple Tree became the official National Tree of Canada in 1996.



RCMP

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police, commonly referred to as "Mounties", can trace its roots to 1868.

Inuksuk

Inuksuk is a figure made of piled stones or boulders traditionally constructed by the Inuit and used as a hunting and navigational aid.

A Mari usque ad Mare (From Sea to Sea) was first used in 1906, and was officially adopted on 21 November, 1921.





Franco-Ontario Flag

Recognized under provincial law as the official emblem of Ontario's French-speaking community. Created in 1975, it was officially recognized in 2001.

The Great Seal of Ontario

The seal has been used since 1 January, 1870. It is used to authenticate documents issued by the government of Ontario.



White Trillium

The Trillium Grandiflorum, or White Trillium, became the provincial emblem of Ontario in 1937.

Tartan of Ontario

Ontario's official tartan was designed in 1965 and officially received Royal Assent in 23 June, 2000.



Flag of Ontario

The flag is the Red Ensign, with the Royal Union Standard in the canton and the Ontario Shield in the fly. The flag was introduced in 1965 after the Great Flag Debate for a new national flag.

Peel Region Flag

The flag was approved by council on 12 July 1979. Its shield is rooted in the former County of Peel, and the stripes represents the three municipalities.



Region of Peel Logo

The Regional Corporate Signature features a styled "P" that is divided into three parts, representing the three municipalities working together.



Town of Caledon Flag

The symbol was adopted on 25 November 2011 to reflect the town's past in industry and agriculture.



Flower City Brampton

The city logo is a yellow rose centred in a blue rectangle. The rose itself connects Brampton



Mississauga City Logo

Launched in 2014, it is rooted in the idea of growth. The five shapes represent the pillars of Mississauga's Strategic Plan: connect, move, prosper, belong, and green initative.



Dufferin-Peel Catholic School Board

The school board oversees 148 schools throughout Mississauga, Brampton, Caledon, and Dufferin

Mississauga Coat of Arms

It is a ceremonial symbol that tells the story of the "First Purchase" between the Crown and Native Mississaugas.

The regional government was formed in 1851, but Peel became an official county in 1867, which would last until 1974 when it was changed to the Region of Peel.

Peel Regional Police (PRP)

Formed in 1974, the PRP is the second largest municipal police service in Ontario, serving over 1.3 million residents in Mississauga and Brampton.



Brampton City Crest

It was created in 1974 as the incorporated City of Brampton. towns and townships.



Mississauga Flag

The city's official flag features the City Crest on a blue background, and printed on blue and orange as the official city colours.





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
